Dear Washington Families,

I wish you health, happiness, and peace for the New Year. The bitter weather serves as a reminder to reset, reflect, and continue our journey together to offer great things to our children. As an instructional leader, student improvement is always on my mind. There are so many ways we can address and measure achievement goals.

As a staff we attend professional development workshops within and outside of our District. One meaningful and practical way we have embraced in our work is called Instructional Rounds. Instructional Rounds is school based and is used to professionalize teaching and improve learning. During Instructional Rounds, school or District teams plan to visit classes and focus on an area staff have identified as a 'problem of practice,' or an area we want to exam to be sure we are meeting student needs. The problem of practice must be related to core instruction for all students, is actionable, and observable. After classroom visits take place, the team gives factual feedback on their observations and helps the school team identify the next level of work. The staff then uses this feedback to connect with and support the ongoing improvement work.

In English Language Arts, we will begin Unit 1 All About Me, our focus includes concepts of print, letter recognition and formation of Mm, Tt, Aa, Ss, Bb, Ii, Ff, and Hh, and rhyming. Things we will be working on as a grade level this month are the following:

ELA: We are working with a new reading curriculum called Magnetic Reading and spelling curriculum. called Spelling Connections. We are kicking off January with unit 6 in Spelling. We work with each set of spelling words for 2 weeks. There are spelling activities that go with each unit. Please support your child by quizzing them on the spelling words to help them become better spellers and writers. They will also be getting vocabulary words to help build their vocab knowledge.

In Magnetic Reading we have learned to summarize a story, identify the theme of a story, make inferences based on the clues in the text, Character traits, and main idea. We are now working on defining the meaning of words.

Science – We wrapped our science projects with our Science fair on December 6th. Our winners were as follows: 3rd Place – Londyn McBride, 2nd Place Aliyat Amuda and Fathia Amuda, and 1st place- Gabriel Hawkins.

Math: We are learning how to use decimal points and different types of angles. Students knowing their multiplication facts are crucial to their success not only in 4th grade, but grades to come.

FIFTH GRADE

First, we will be learning how to determine the meaning of figurative language with an excerpt from Water Rolls, Water Rises and the story Rain in Summer. We are also using our inferencing skills to understand the non-fiction selections Water, the Liquid of Life and Hidden Water.

In Math, we are starting our study of Decimals, as we continue to work on Fractions. This unit is especially important because fractions play a huge part in the Spring IAR testing. We will be learning how to use our place value strategies to understand decimals, as well as how to add, subtract, multiply and divide decimals-just as we did for fractions.

In Social Studies, we are exploring the continents and the many countries in the world. How are cultures similar? How are they different? What languages are spoken in other countries? We are preparing for a project in which we will share our research skills and present what we have learned.

In Science, it's all about the Earth. We are learning the layers of the earth and the role that each layer plays. It is a fascinating journey in learning how our Earth works.

Reminders: Homework gives your child the opportunity to practice skills taught in class. Homework is assigned Monday thru Thursday. Reading should take place in the home for at least 30 minutes a day.

Building coping skills is huge during this time. Changes are constantly happening. A coping skill is something that helps a person deal with unpleasant feelings such as stress. Learning to cope is a very important skill that takes a lot of practice. Parents and guardians can help children build coping skills. Brainstorming as a family is a tool of coping. When someone in the family needs to access a "tool" to cope, they will have it in their toolbox. What works for one person, may not work for everyone, so it is important to try different coping skills to find what works for each member of the family. Take time to talk about which strategies were helpful or which strategy everyone might try next time a strategy is needed. Some examples of coping skills include exercise, keeping a gratitude journal, talking with positive people in your life such as friends, family and teachers, deep breathing, listening to or playing music, or engaging in a hobby that you enjoy.

Welcome back from winter break. I hope everyone had an enjoyable time with family and friends.

As the weather gets colder as we progress into winter, frost bite and frost nip can be a concern. So please, make sure your child is dressed for the weather with hats, gloves, scarves, boots, and warm coats. Frost bite is frozen body tissue and is characterized by white, waxy skin that feels numb. There are varying degrees depending on how deep the tissue is injured. The areas of the body most prone to frost bite are head, face, ears, hands, and feet. Children are at greater risk due to heat loss from the skin occurring more rapidly. A child outdoors having fun is reluctant to want to come indoors. Frost bite needs immediate medical attention from a health care provider. Frost nip is a milder injury. It usually affects the cheeks, ears, nose, fingers, or toes, causing them to be red, numb, and tingling. Frost nip can be treated at home. If it occurs, bring the child indoors, remove wet clothing, and immerse affected body parts in warm, not hot, water for 20 to 30 minutes. Do not allow the child to regulate the temperature of the water, as numb hands won't feel the heat, and this can lead to burning. Body heat can also be used to re-warm the child. Do not use stoves, radiators, or fireplaces due to numbness of body part and loss of feeling. Call the doctor if sensation does not return and seek medical help.

If you or your emergency contacts phone number has changed, please contact the school. Updated information is very important if your child is ill, or an emergency has occurred.

It is not too early to make appointments for your future kindergarten or sixth graders to get their physical and immunizations as required by the state. Feel free to contact me with any questions or if you need the forms. I can be reached at (708)201-2078 extension 2397.

Socially Speaking.....From Your School Social Workers

Hi, and Happy New Year to everyone!

We are hoping that you had a safe, warm, and jolly holiday! Out with the old and in with the NEW! Say GOODBYE to 2023, and HELLO to 2024! You may feel a little more hopeful, more tired, or all those things at once. All those feelings are OK! If you are looking for some assistance to help focus on your new year goals, here is a step-by-step guide on how to make goals for this new year happen! If the goals are for children or your family, make sure they help you in setting them up! They want to have some control too.

- <u>Specific</u>: A goal needs to be very definitive, so you know exactly when the goal has been met. You must be as clear as possible when determining what you want to achieve. Narrow it down as much as you can so you can understand exactly what you need to do to achieve it.

 When teaching kids about SMART goals, it is best to explain this part by saying
- their goal should answer the questions: who, what, when, where, and why.

 Measurable: How will you know you are making progress toward reaching your goal along the way? With a measurable goal, you should be able to answer questions such as How much? or how many? This will help you track your progress and re-evaluate if necessary and take corrective action along the

Let children know that this component usually involves a few of some sort.

- <u>Achievable</u>: Before you start acting toward meeting your goal, you need to
 determine if there are additional steps you may need to take to better prepare
 yourself for success. For example, if you are not a runner, you will not want to
 sign up for the next full marathon that is happening in your area-you would
 want to start with something realistic such as a 5K. Creating unachievable
 goals is frustrating because you will not be successful. For kids, their goals
 should be neither too easy nor too hard.
- Relevant: Your goals should be in line with your long-term vision. If you set a goal that, once achieved, has not brought you any closer to reaching your larger objectives, you may realize that you have wasted your time and effort. Why is each of your goals important and what is your motivation behind achieving them? How will you benefit once the goal has been reached? Consider these guestions to make sure your goals are relevant.
- <u>Time-Bound: You need a deadline to remain focused and motivated toward reaching your goals.</u> Having a timeline will give you milestones that will keep you moving forward with making progress toward achieving your goal.

Examples could be "I will make an extra \$50 in an allowance before school is out to ensure I have money for chips and cheese. I will complete my homework when I get out of school without assistance" or "The family will run in a 5k together before August. We will do this by practicing running 3 times a week together."

Ask Questions to Get Your Child Thinking and Talking About Reading

Helping your child reflect on what they read can help improve their reading, but it can also help improve their comprehension. How can you help them reflect? By asking a lot of questions!

You might ask questions like the following:

- Who were the main characters? What did you like or dislike about them? Do they remind you of people you know? How?
- What happened in the story? How did it start? What happened in the middle? How did it end? Were you happy with the way the book ended?
- Have you ever experienced something that happened to the characters in the story?
- What would you change about the book if you were the author? What plot would make a good sequel?

By teaching them to reflect on their reading, they will begin to develop good reading habits that will make them lifelong learners. A famous African Philosopher said, "A Lifelong Learner is a Lifelong Winner!"

Winter blues got you down. Don't know what to do with the kiddos during the cold, winter months? Try singing songs and chants to the little ones about winter to help them practice counting and rhyming. 


SEVENTH GRADE



It's been rough; however, we're pushing through. This month our Eighth Graders will begin Unit 4 focusing on Functions. Students are all aware that the lessons we are working on in the book are always available to them online on iReady. All book assignments are posted on Teams and should be turned in on Teams within the assignment.

I say this every month because I cannot say this enough but...I-Ready is a personalized instruction path that helps students fill prerequisite gaps and build up grade-level skills. Therefore, it is IMPERATIVE that students are not only completing their Teacher-Assigned Lessons and Homework but also, that they are completing assignments in their My Path Assignment Logs. Students should be logging on to i-Ready EVERYDAY during Intervention which is built into their schedules from 8:50-9:15! On some days, students are given extra time in class to work on assignments and My Path. It is a requirement and grade for students to complete at least 45 minutes AND 2 lessons each week. Please ensure your student is logging on each day...each week to i-Ready!

Greetings and Happy New Year! Let the new year bring many opportunities of growth and development to us all! The close of Quarter 2 is upon us which means only two more quarters to go! In 8th Grade ELA, students are viewing and analyzing their growth data from Middle of Year testing and setting goals for End of Year testing. They recently completed a Writer's Workshop that allowed them to write their own narrative detailing a first experience. The workshop gave students the opportunity to demonstrate their writing skills while telling a story that was unique and personal to them. Also, students are exploring new vocabulary words as they read and learn about how the Grand Columbian Carnival helped to unite the world. In our Ready Common Core workbooks, students are determining the theme of texts, and demonstrating the skill by completing activities related to an excerpt from the Realistic Fiction, "The Canoe Breaker." We are halfway to the goal line, and we will continue to push for a strong finish.
